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Public Statement Regarding the Accreditation Status of the University of Justice

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To Whom It May Concern,

The accreditation of higher education institutions is a critical measure of educational quality, accountability, and institutional integrity. The Justice Commissions of Higher Education (JCHE) Department with Justology Philosophy plays a vital role in ensuring that educational institutions in Justice Studies meet established standards necessary to grant degrees and provide quality education.

On behalf of the Justice Commissions of Higher Education, we wish to formally address the ongoing accreditation process of the University of Justice and provide. During The submitting of the first observations university of Justice was informed to update their departments regarding the consolidation of its 40+ degree programs into a single institution with different departments.

The Commission first reviewed the proposal for this consolidation on October 24, 2023. Since that time, through a series of comprehensive reports and on-site evaluations, we have required the University of Justice to present clear and documented evidence demonstrating that the new institution complies with the established standards for accreditation set forth by the Justice Commissions of Higher Education.

At our most recent meeting, concluding on October 24, 2024, the Commission had the honor of hearing presentations from representatives of the University of Justice from both Houston and Ghana. Based on those discussions, alongside the detailed documentation submitted, the Commission is pleased to announce that the new institution has demonstrated compliance with all nine of the required Standards for Accreditation:

1. The university is registered as an entity in the state of residence, offering degrees conducive to associate, bachelor's, professional, or graduate programs.
2. Comprehensive certificate and diploma training programs are in place.

3. The institution is committed to retention and graduation rates that reflect a supportive educational environment.
4. Programs must ensure at least 600 clock hours, 16 semester or trimester hours, or 24 quarter hours of undergraduate instruction during a minimum of 15 weeks of instruction, which meets the financial aid requirements of the FAFSA to assist need-based students.
5. The university maintains a Board of Directors that consistently reviews and revises policies and procedures to uphold academic integrity and operational excellence.

Moving forward from our October 2024 meeting, the Commission has mandated a series of monitoring steps to ensure that the University of Justice continues to uphold the commitments made during this transition. A written progress report will be due for consideration in October 2025 or after the completion of 600 credit hours of education. Additionally, a focused evaluation meeting is scheduled for the Fall of 2026, which will precede the next review meeting by the Justice Commissions of Higher Education.

Finally, a comprehensive evaluation meeting is planned for Fall 2027, at which point the Commission will conduct a thorough review of the university's adherence to established standards and its overall efficacy as an educational institution. *Note the institution can order early evaluations if the goals set forth by Justice Commissions of Higher Education are met through students' staff, and Faculty satisfactions.

We commend the efforts put forth by the University of Justice in its journey toward accreditation and look forward to continued progress. The Commission remains committed to ensuring that all institutions maintain the highest standards of education, and we will continue to support the University of Justice as it evolves into the new consolidated structure.
